Part B: Review of the previous academic year

Outcomes for disadvantaged pupils

Since 20/21 we have been supporting a low attaining year 4 cohort with a variety of different resources/ approaches as they have moved through the school in addition to providing an updated IT infrastructure across the whole school to support teaching and learning and targeted tuition for specific groups and individuals across the school.

From Autumn 2020 to KS2 SATs 2023 there was an increase in those who achieved the expected standard or higher across the entire cohort as we focussed upon a combination of quality first time teaching alongside targeted interventions for some children.
